Dear Sacred Heart Family,

This week I will be going on my own retreat in Virginia – I always look forward to spending some quite time to deepen my relationship with the Lord. Then I depart for Poland to take part in an International Summer Camp for youth with disabilities. An American contingent is going over, and I agreed to be their chaplain. This Camp is in its 33nd year, and it is sponsored by the Order of Malta. If you have never heard of this group, it has quite a history.

In 1048, a Christian religious community received permission to operate a hospital and chapel in Jerusalem for pilgrims of all faiths. In 1099 when the First Crusade established a Christian Kingdom there, they were further given the responsibility of defending pilgrims who journeyed to the Holy Land. So they became not just a religious order but also knights and were called the "'Knights Hospitaller". As their own sovereign Order, they printed their own money and had diplomatic relationships with many different countries. After they were pushed out of Jerusalem, they established themselves on the island of Rhodes and then Malta. They had their own navy which defended Christians, and took part in the Battle of Lepanto in 1571 which saved Rome from an Ottoman invasion. When Napoleon conquered Malta, they relocated to Rome, where they still are headquartered.

While they remain a sovereign Order (they are officially called the "Sovereign Military Hospitaller Order of St John of Jerusalem of Rhodes and of Malta"), they no longer have any armies, but focus instead on medical, social and humanitarian projects in most countries around the world, including running hospitals in Bethlehem and the Syrian city of Aleppo. Their social projects provide support for forgotten or excluded members of society, and they are dedicated to the preservation of human dignity and the care of all those in need, regardless of their race or religion. The highest members are still lay men who take religious vows of poverty, obedience and chastity. Other lay men and women who can only make a vow of obedience become Knights and Dames in Obedience. Finally, other men and women can join who do not profess religious vows or the promise of obedience, but who live according to the principles of the Church and of the Order; they are also called Knights and Dames.

The International Summer Camp in Poland will host about 500 youth from around the world, with about 200 physically and mentally disabled attending for a week of prayer and activities. After it is over, I will then take the opportunity to spend 4 days with my sister, her husband and newly-baptized niece at their home in Switzerland.

While I will be away for the next two weekends, Fr. George and Fr. Early will be filling in for me, and you will all be in my prayers. Please keep me in yours!!
